#### 1. Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Paul Ashdown, Maddie Baker-Woods, Matt Carney, Sarsfield Donohue, Michael Ladd, James Mallinder, Tom McGarry, Lisa Perkins, Carol Poulter and Jane Topping.

Apologies for absence were also received from Nicole Rickard.

#### 2. Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Steve Gallant presented the Minutes from the last meeting of the Board held on 6 December 2021 and it was by consensus

#### **RESOLVED**

That the Minutes of the Community Partnership Board Meeting held on 6 December 2021 be approved as a true record.

## 3. Focus on Community Partnerships

This item was introduced by Letitia Smith. She highlighted that there was no detailed update on all of the eight Community Partnerships for this meeting, however a full written update would be included in the meeting papers for the June 2022 meeting.

#### Aldeburgh, Leiston, Saxmundham and Villages Community Partnership

The Board received a short presentation from Tony Cooper, Chair of the Community Partnership, and Zoe Botten, Communities Officer. The presentation covered the Aldeburgh, Leiston, Saxmundham and Villages Community Partnership's three priorities which were:

- Encourage and enable everyone to be to be more physically active and healthy
- Reduce social isolation and loneliness particularly carers, older people and men over 40
- Education, opportunities and aspirations

The Community Partnership's key achievement had been working in partnership with the Integrated Neighbourhood Teams for shared priorities, which had focussed on:

- Childhood obesity
- Dental Care for young people
- Mental Health provisions

As a result of this partnership working, there had been an increase in the sharing information/ data, sharing resources and match funding opportunities. The Board were updated on the wide range of projects that the Community Partnership had supported during 2021/22, which included: ActivLives Rural Programme, Dementia Project, Mental Health Workshop Pilot, Healthy Movers, Small Grants Scheme, Arts Project, Talking Benches, Walking Football and the Promotion of Existing Groups.

Tony Cooper said that there were a number of conflicting issues in the area, which had been quite challenging, however he was pleased with what had been achieved to date, which had made a positive difference to local residents.

Steve Gallant commented about having a small grants scheme and the need to understand the ethos of the Community Partnerships, to ensure that there was appropriate use of the funding. In response to a query from Chris Blundell, Zoe Botten confirmed that match funding would be sought wherever possible, to supplement the various projects underway.

Mark Jepson queried if EDF was supportive of the work of the Community Partnerships and if they would assist in any way. Steve Gallant confirmed that EDF were supportive of the Community Partnerships and as the programme progressed with Sizewell, additional funding channels would emerge.

In respect of the shared priority of dentistry, it was noted that 46 patients were seen by the visiting dental service in Leiston, with patients being triaged before they went in and this had been very positively received. It was hoped that further sessions could be arranged, which would be part funded by Suffolk County Council, to see the outstanding patients in the area. Steve Gallant commented that there was the potential for the Community Partnerships to get further involved in visiting dental services, as dental provision was sporadic across the district, with Felixstowe having plenty of dentists, while other areas such as Leiston and Lowestoft did not have enough.

#### Melton, Woodbridge, Deben Peninsula Community Partnership

The Board received a short presentation from Julia Catterwell, Communities Officer. The presentation highlighted the 2 priorities for the Community Partnership, which were:

- Developing Community Hubs
- Improving the opportunities and services for Young People

It was noted that 24 projects had received a total of £60,000 of funding. The projects had included: Wheelchair/Picnic area and benches, Community Farm, Rewild Areas, Family Bee Keeping Club, Mentoring, Community Radio, Rural Youth Clubs, Back to Scouting and New Play Equipment.

The next steps for the Community Partnership involved distributing a survey to determine current needs, gaps and the way forward, as well as becoming more visible to local communities. Discussions on how to become more visible would take place as a workshop at the next scheduled Community Partnership meeting.

Alexander Nicholl commented that it was important to review the Community Partnership memberships regularly, as sometimes people became too busy and dropped out, whilst other people become more interested in being involved, as their circumstances changed. Steve Gallant stated that this was a valid point and he felt that Community Partnership meetings should take place in person and be more of a workshop style meeting, rather than a formal meeting, which increased engagement.

Steve Gallant thanked Tony Cooper, Zoe Botten and Julia Catterwell for their interesting updates on their Community Partnerships.

#### 4. Mental Health and Wellbeing Task and Finish Group

N.B. Roger Wright left during the discussions on this item.

The Board received a presentation on the Mental Health and Wellbeing Task and Finish Group from Chris Abraham, in the absence of Nicole Rickard. It was noted that Mental Health and Wellbeing was one of the three priorities for the Community Partnership Board, as identified through the 8 workshops held to launch the Community Partnerships in 2019. Following the 6 December 2021 Community Partnership Board meeting, and the presentation received from Jon Neil, Chief Officer of Suffolk MIND, a Task and Finish Group had been formed to explore the concepts introduced by Jon and report back to the next Board meeting.

Chris Abraham reported that the Task and Finish Group had met on 11 February 2022. Representation on the group included Community Action Suffolk, Suffolk Community Foundation, Suffolk Mind, Norfolk and Suffolk Foundation Trust, Britten Arts, Suffolk County Council and East Suffolk Council. The group undertook an audit of existing activity around mental health and wellbeing in East Suffolk and Suffolk and the conversation then moved on to identifying gaps in emotional wellbeing.

The Task and Finish Group had provided an outcome proposal, which would support 7 distinct projects to assist Emotional Wellbeing. This would complement a programme of activity already planned by East Suffolk, which would be launched at 3 networking events across the District in March. It was noted that the Task and Finish Group would meet again shortly and an update would be provided at the next Community Partnership Board meeting in June 2022.

Steve Gallant commented about a recent event, where he had met a number of year 11 pupils from Beccles Free School. He had been saddened that they had been unable to attend a variety of trips and excursions during their time in school. The impact of Covid upon young people had been significant. The constant images of the war in Ukraine on social media also had a huge impact and it was important that they were supported.

Stephen Singleton stated that it was important to have a resource to keep track of all the help and support that was currently available, as there was the possibility of duplication and fragmentation. It was best to have integrated support, with different groups working together and signposting. Steve Gallant stated it would be helpful for the Task and Finish group to map the help available and also publicise what could be accessed, as people needed to know where to go for help.

Letitia Smith commented that many young people may feel sad and depressed but they may not know exactly why. It was important to share how people were feeling and feel that they were not alone.

Chris Blundell sought clarification regarding the 3 mental health networking events and whether Members could attend? Luke Bennett stated that he would check with the Communities Team and let them know that the CP Chairs would like to be involved in the events. He would also ask Andy Joliffe to speak to Chris outside of the meeting.

Mark Jepson stated that he was supportive of the £122,000 being spent, however he wanted to know how the outcomes of the funding would be captured? Chris Abraham confirmed

that this information was included in the Outcome Proposal and reassurance was provided that Steve Gallant would need to sign off all funding requests, as Chairman of the Board. Stephen Singleton reported that additional references could be requested from those groups making bids for funding and he may be able to assist in this respect.

Steve Gallant reported that the updated year-end figures had been made available, since the report was produced. Therefore, the funding available for 2021/22 was now £75,923 which left £46,477 from 2022/23. There being no further comments or questions, it was therefore by consensus

#### **RESOLVED**

- 1) That the outcome proposal attached as Appendix A to this report which proposed the allocation of £75,923 from the 2021/22 budget and £46,447 from the 2022/23 budget total funding of £122,400 be approved.
- 2) That a report on progress would be received at the Board meeting to be held in June 2022.

## 5. Tackling Inequalities – Focus on Financial Inequality

The Board received a short presentation on Financial Inequality from Nick Khan; he summarised the information provided by Citizen's Advice, with detail on the numbers of people affected, the ways in which they were financially affected and 2 case studies.

The Board were then invited to use the 'Problem Solving Tree' to discuss Financial Inequality in groups, and to look at the cause, the problem and the effect. Each group would then be asked to feed back to the Board ways that could help people in financial difficulty.

A summary of suggestions that could assist and help people avoid getting into financial difficulties included:

- Don't try and solve all problems at once, help in small ways
- Signpost people to sources of support such as debt management advice or Citizens Advice
- Provide assistance with budget management training for adults
- Provide life skills including budgeting for young people in schools
- Different ways to make cheap and nutritious meals
- Highlight ways to check and compare prices for the cheapest petrol, insurance, utilities
- How to get referrals to foodbanks and other sources of practical help
- Use the coffee caravan to provide help, support and information to those people who cannot travel

The Board noted that many people were starting struggle for the first time, often when they were in work, which was upsetting and traumatic for them. There was no shame in

someone admitting that they were struggling, however it was important to get the right help and support early, to try and stop problems from escalating.

Letitia Smith commented that most people were only one step away from financial trouble. If someone was made redundant and lost their job, it would have a devastating affect on their financial position and security.

Steve Gallant commented that people were having more problems now and that the cost of living crisis was only going to become more challenging over time. Therefore, it was important to provide early intervention whenever possible. He suggested setting up a Financial Inequality Task and Finish Group and the outcomes of their discussions would be used to inform a programme of work to problem solve these issues and come up with some solutions.

#### **RESOLVED**

- 1) That the update on Financial Inequality be noted.
- 2) That a Financial Inequality Task and Finish Group be created to discuss the situation and their proposals would be brought to the next Community Partnership Board meeting in June 2022.

## 6. Update from the Transport and Travel Task and Finish Group

The Board received a short presentation from Nick Khan, Alexander Nicholl and Norman Brooks on the work of the Transport and Travel Task and Finish Group. Transport and Travel was a key priority for the Board and there were ongoing difficulties due to a lack of transport in rural areas. A summary was then provided on the 4 pilot schemes that were currently underway:

#### **KATCH**

- A new route had been opened between Wickham Market Station at Campsea Ashe, Tunstall and Snape, which utilised the second bus.
- Bus utilisation had been severely affected through the pandemic, through lack of rider confidence, which had lowered the fares for Katch.
- Katch had recently won national awards:
  - 2021 QSI Professional Drivers Awards Community Award (GOLD)
  - $\circ$  2021 Community Rail Awards Influencing Positive Change & Sustainability (WINNER)
- Steady increase in fares, but a persistent high subsidy requirement
- Over 2.5k fares in the first 6 months
- Bookings roughly 50% on the phone and 50% via the app
- Multiple occupancy increased over the summer months (when Covid rates lower)

#### **CATS led Demand Responsive Transport Pilot**

Proposal which had been informed by consultation with the community partnership:

- Pilot to focus on enhancing the "East" Demand Responsive service which runs between Walberswick/Blythburgh and Sudborne/Campsea Ashe
- Findings from the questionnaire indicated that marketing will be key

- Will add flexibility to payments and bookings with technology (an app, cashless payments)

#### **BACT led Demand Responsive Transport Pilot**

Recommendation still being developed:

- Clear need for a new service in the Lound/Blundeston/Somerleyton/Gunton/St Margaret area
- Evident that those without a public bus service would use a bus to get to Lowestoft, James Paget and Oulton Broad, if there was awareness of the service
- Weighing up a timetabled demand responsive service (like Katch) and a fully demand responsive service (like CATS proposal) Beccles 1% Norwich 2% Bradwell 3%St Olaves 3% Hopton 6% Somerleyton 7% Other local villages 8% Oulton Broad 14%

## **Tackling Loneliness with Transport Fund**

Expressions of Interest in the "Tackling Loneliness with Transport Fund" (DfT):

- Bid submitted for £140k additional support for the transport project.
- Bid focussed on the Demand Responsive Digital Application project and increasing transport accessibility for rural communities
- The bid was endorsed by Transport East
- Currently awaiting confirmation of whether our "expression of interest" can progress to the next stage of evaluation

Steve Gallant commented that he was pleased with the developments, however he was concerned about the communications in relation to the pilots. It was important that they were properly advertised and were seen by the people they were set up to assist. The communications would need to be ongoing and should have a modern approach. Nick Khan commented that the Communities Manager had a background in marketing and he could assist with this area of work. All those present were very supportive of the work undertaken to date.

#### **RESOLVED**

That the update from the Transport and Travel Task and Finish Group be received.

#### 7. Presentation from the Greenprint Forum

The Board received a short presentation from Susan Harvey and Daniel Wareing; which summarised the aims, membership and the Quiet Lanes project. It was noted that since the Greenprint Forum had been established in 1994, it had held 208 events, had assisted with Council Policy changes and been instrumental in the hedgerow survey across Suffolk.

The Forum also had a £20,000 pot of funding for small grants schemes, with a focus upon Nature First, to help biodiversity. To date, 11 projects had been awarded a total of £8,000. It was noted that it was important to make sure that any events held were fun, as this helped to maintain engagement with members of all ages.

There was also a lot of partnership work being undertaken in relation to the Climate Emergency Plan and there would be a workshop on this at the upcoming Community Partnership Forum.

Andrew Nicoll suggested that it may be helpful to have a Suffolk County Council representative on the Greenprint Forum and it was agreed that this would be looked into.

Chris Abraham asked how many of the lanes in East Suffolk were designated at Quiet Lanes? It was confirmed that over half were now Quiet Lanes, which was a significant achievement.

There being no further questions, it was

#### **RESOLVED**

That the presentation on the Greenprint Forum be received.

# 8. Update on the Community Partnership Forum on 25 March 2022

Steve Gallant reported that the Community Partnership Forum, which was to be held at Trinity Park, was fully booked, with 220 delegates. There were 12 workshops for the delegates to choose from and 15 partner organisations were involved. An additional breakfast session for businesses had been arranged on "Social Value and Climate Change - Commercial Ask", which was sponsored by Suffolk County Council.

The market place was also fully booked, with 30 stalls. The keynote speaker was Jonathan Owen (CEO NALC) who would give a presentation on "Partnerships and Parishes".

It was noted that the Forum should be a great success and all Board members were encouraged to attend, if possible.

## **RESOLVED**

That the Update on the Community Partnership Forum be received.

#### 9. Any other business

Danny Steel informed those present that Lowestoft and Northern Parishes Community Partnership were holding an event at Park Hill on Saturday, from 10.00am to 1.00pm to showcase the projects and organisations they had been working with. It was hoped that additional groups would become involved in the Community Partnership. Everyone would be welcome to attend.

#### 10. Dates of Future Meetings

Steve Gallant raised the future dates of the Community Partnership Board meetings, which were noted as:

- 13 June 2022
- 5 September 2022
- 5 December 2022

In response to a question from Steve Gallant, those members present confirmed that meeting in person was preferred to having virtual meetings.

Steve then asked Luke to contact all Board members to seek their views about the timings of future meetings, to see if it would be better to hold the meetings during the day time or evening. A decision would then be taken about the timings of future meetings, once Board members views had been sought.

# East Suffolk Community Partnership Board (CPB) - Terms of Reference

Community Partnerships (CPs) are an innovative way for the Council, partners and communities to work together to 'bring ideas to life' by taking a local approach to local priorities.

#### 1. Form and Membership

#### 1.1 The core CPB membership is:

The Chair (or in their absence the Vice-Chair) of the eight Community Partnerships:

- Aldeburgh, Leiston, Saxmundham and villages Community Partnership
- Beccles, Bungay, Halesworth and villages Community Partnership
- Carlton Colville, Kessingland, Southwold and villages Community Partnership
- Felixstowe Peninsular Community Partnership
- Framlingham, Wickham Market and villages Community Partnership
- Kesgrave, Rushmere St Andrew, Martlesham, Carlford and Fynn Valley Community Partnership
- Lowestoft and Northern Parishes Community Partnership
- Melton, Woodbridge and Deben Peninsular Community Partnership

#### Two representatives from each of:

- East Suffolk Council
- NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups (to reflect Ipswich & East Suffolk / Great Yarmouth & Waveney CCG's)
- Suffolk County Council
- Suffolk Police (to reflect the Policing Command Areas)

#### At least two representatives from:

- The Business sector
- The Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise sector
- Youth Voice

## A representative from:

- Greenprint Forum
- Suffolk Association of Local Councils

The CPB will nominate a rural 'champion' – representing and championing the views and needs of rural communities.

1.2 The core members of the CPB will be expected to live, work or trade in East Suffolk; have sufficient authority to speak for their organisation/partnership; and report back to their organisation/partnership on the activities of the CPB.

- 1.3 The quorum for any meeting of the CPB will be one third of the members of the CPB. If there is not a quorum present at each meeting of the CPB, it will not be able to make any decisions at that meeting.
- 1.4 The membership of the CPB will be reviewed annually.

#### 2. CPB Principles

- Involve local councils, public services, communities, voluntary sector organisations and businesses in planning and delivering joined up services that meet local needs
- Make the best collective use of our assets and resources
- Base decisions on data and intelligence about local places
- Identify, understand and address deprivation, disadvantage and hidden needs and consider how CPB decision impact on both rural and non-rural areas
- Champion, represent and influence on behalf of East Suffolk and the eight Community Partnerships

#### 3. Role of the CPB

- i) Focus on cross cutting issues for which no one organisation is solely responsible
- ii) Actively support and send representatives to participate in the CPs Annual Forum
- iii) Develop an annual work plan based on local data and knowledge to address the cross-cutting CP priorities, and support delivery of the ES Strategic Plan
- iv) Support the CP priorities to address identified gaps in service provision using a solution focused and problem-solving approach
- v) Monitor and adapt its agenda in response to emerging issues affecting an individual CP area or a wider area in ES, including issues raised through Youth Voice and other sources of community intelligence
- vi) Receive reports quarterly from the CP's on progress against their priorities, and such other verbal/written reports from other organisations or partnership bodies, as requested.
- vii) Develop proposals for expenditure against the annual Strategic budget of £300k per annum and seek authorisation for actual expenditure from the Leader of ESC
- viii) Seek funds from other external sources in order to deliver the priorities of the CPB
- ix) Create Task & Finish/Working Groups as required to explore specific issues / priorities in greater detail.
- x) Conduct or commission research into policy or service delivery issues affecting East Suffolk
- xi) Ensure that all decisions have given due regard to the direct and indirect impacts on rural areas

#### 4. Chair and Vice Chair of CPs

- 4.1 The CPB will be chaired by the Leader of ESC (a detailed Job Description is available). The chair will:
  - Provide a strong sense of purpose and direction to the CPB
  - Drive the CPB's annual work programme

4.2 A Vice Chair will be elected annually by the members of the CP and will deputise for the Chair in his/her absence.

#### 5. Meetings of the CPs

- 5.1 CPB meetings will be by invitation but held in public and their style will be inclusive and interactive. Wherever possible, they will be organised to problem solve (for example workshop style) rather than as formal meetings. They will be held at least three times a year, but additional meetings may be called by the Chair as necessary, on at least five clear working days written notice. Task and Finish Groups may be established in order to progress CPB business between meetings.
- 5.2 The dates of each CPB meeting will be agreed in advance by the CPB and they will be held at a suitable venue within East Suffolk or remotely using video conferencing facilities.
- 5.3 Any member of the CPB may request that an item be included on the agenda for a meeting. The meeting papers will be published on the ESC website no later than five clear working days before the meeting.
- 5.4 Agendas and action points arising from each meeting will be recorded and published on the Community Partnership pages of the ESC website.

#### 6. Voting

6.1 The aim at each CPB meeting will be to reach decisions by a consensus, however, should a vote be necessary, then all core members of the CPB (as listed in 1.1) will be eligible to vote, and each will have one vote, indicated by a show of hands or by core members stating their vote verbally if the meeting is being conducted by video conference. The Chair of the CPB will determine when there is no consensus and therefore an issue should be put to the vote, however the Chair may wish to instigate a formal vote in relation to any funding matters. A majority vote of those present and voting will prevail. The Chairman of the CPB will have a casting vote.

#### 7. Financial Accountability

7.1 The ES Council will operate as an accountable body for the CPB. The CPB budget will be allocated against agreed priorities (using clear criteria) which will be agreed at the first meeting of the CPB and reviewed annually. These are designed to ensure that this funding is not used for purposes beyond the ES Council's powers, or the law, and that all projects supported align with the ES Council's Strategic Plan.

The youth research in Halesworth will soon be underway with Access Community Trust delivering this. The youth research will inform a local stakeholder group ('Youth Action Halesworth-Rural; YAH-R') about young people's views of youth provision now and for the future. This will also generate learning for the rest of the patch as some themes will resonate in other wards. The oral health packs were funded, and these will include a toothbrush, tube of toothpaste, timer, information sheet (tailored for 11 year olds; provided by Community Dental Services) and a paper bag. These will be distributed in May 2022 with evaluation taking place by the end of the school term. The slipper swap builds on the success in the Carlton Colville CP area, and this will be delivered in partnership with Phil from Suffolk Family Carers.

The Mental Health Friendly Towns initiative (named 'Hearts and Minds') has now been completed in Bungay, Beccles and Halesworth. Bungay received very positive feedback with 25 people regularly attending the course from across the community. Beccles and Halesworth are currently receiving feedback forms back and the Communities officer will be meeting with the provider (Access Community Trust) to discuss the project and the learning from this.

Follow-up events will be held in each town to celebrate the learning from the sessions and continue the conversation.

Rural asset mapping has taken place to identify tangible and intangible assets as well as gaps and opportunities in villages and parishes. A survey with parish councils that fed into this received sixteen responses out of 23 (70%) and the remaining parish councils are being chased for responses. One key success from this exercise was more awareness of parish newsletters and the CP now has an article in the parish newsletters identified promoting the work of the CP and how local people can get involved.

Following the January CP meeting, we set up a Task and Finish Group to home in on the themes that came up at the November workshop around physical and mental health and wellbeing. The T&FG included representation from ECCH, the Pear Tree Centre, Bungay Community Support, Everyone Active and OneLife Suffolk. The actions and recommendations from this are being further distilled so that the Community Partnership can determine what it can do and would like to do.

Melton Parish Council was awarded funding toward new play equipment on their sports field and additional planting to improve biodiversity with the Suffolk Wildlife Trust holding workshops for families. Rendlesham Community Radio was supported by the CP, and they aim to reach those struggling with behavioural and educational issues as well as finding hidden local talent. Young performers explore their potential in performing arts; express challenges they face and tell their stories through their chosen art form. Deben Farm supported by the CP; Back to Nature is a project based at the Deben Community Farm to make a piece of woodland on the farm more accessible to the young people that attend the farm either through the care

### East Suffolk Community Partnership Board

#### Report from the Tackling Inequalities Task and Finish Group

#### June 13, 2022

#### **Introduction and Background**

- 1. At the December Board meeting, it was agreed that the Board should maintain its focus on its three current priorities Social Isolation and Loneliness, Sustainable Transport and Travel and Mental Health and Wellbeing and establish a Task and Finish Group focussing on Tackling Inequalities.
- 2. The Tackling Inequalities Group was tasked to focus on four key areas Young People, Ageing Population and Older People, Income Deprivation (all age groups) and Groups vulnerable to Covid-19/left behind in Covid Recovery.
- 3. The Task and Finish Group includes representatives from Community Action Suffolk, Suffolk Community Foundation, Britten Pears Arts, Norfolk and Waveney CCG and East Suffolk Council. It has now met twice, and at the first meeting it was agreed that the initial focus of the group would be on the Income Deprivation priority, but the widest possible focus on the various dimensions of the emerging and deepening Cost of Living crisis.

#### **Cost of Living increases**

- 4. The 'cost of living' is the average amount of money that individuals need to be able to cover basic living expenses, such as food and housing. The cost of living is rising across the board housing costs, energy and water costs, fuel and food have all risen rapidly in price over recent months.
- 5. The impact of these rises, combined with the residual impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on individuals, families, communities and the voluntary sector is likely to hit hard, particularly in Winter 2022/23. Inflation continues to climb, and the invasion of Ukraine by Russia has further increased pressures at a local and national level.
- 6. Suffolk County Council has produced a Cost of Living Profile which can be found at: <a href="Making-ends-meet-the-cost-of-living-suffolk.pdf">Making-ends-meet-the-cost-of-living-suffolk.pdf</a> (healthysuffolk.org.uk). This is accompanied by an interactive dashboard which will be updated as more information becomes available.

#### **Tackling Inequalities Task and Finish Group**

- 7. The Task and Finish Group, supported by staff in the Communities Team at East Suffolk Council, has identified four key areas for action:
  - Money
  - Food and Essentials
  - Energy and Fuel
  - Housing
- 8. Over the course of its meetings, the group has established the key challenges in relation to each of these four themes, identified existing activity to address these themes and proposed new ideas for action. These will be presented and discussed at the Board meeting.
- 9. A partner workshop was held on Monday 31<sup>st</sup> May at Halesworth Golf Club to enable codesign of the emerging programme and provide an opportunity for wider discussion and prioritisation. The workshop included representatives from Access Community Trust, Citizens Advice East Suffolk, East Suffolk Council, Ipswich and East Suffolk CCG, Lowestoft Rising, Suffolk Community Foundation, Suffolk County Council and MP Peter Aldous. The outcomes of this workshop session will be considered at the Board meeting.
- 10. The emerging programme is ambitious and far reaching in that it includes more than 60 projects/activities, in addition to a wide range of activities that will provide the foundation of the programme, for example a campaign, a programme of roadshows across our market towns this summer and a web portal bringing together a range of useful information in one place.
- 11. More than £300,000 of funding has already been secured for specific elements of the programme:
  - 1. £196,000 from East Suffolk Council for two new Financial Inclusion Officers for two years
  - 2. £42,000 from the ESC Covid Recovery Fund towards three food projects Community Pantries, Community Fridges/Freezers and Comfort Food
  - 3. £18,000 from ESC Councillor 2021/22 Enabling Communities Budgets for Comfort Food
  - 4. Up to £55,000 from ESC Councillor 2022/23 Enabling Communities Budgets towards the overall East Suffolk Cost of Living programme.

#### Outcome Proposal – Tackling the Rising Cost of Living in East Suffolk

12. Attached as Appendix 1 to this report is the Stage 1 Outcome Proposal developed on the basis of the discussion at the Task and Finish Group meeting, an internal ESC workshop for staff from key services and the partner workshop held on 31<sup>st</sup> May. This sets out a proposed programme of projects (both crisis intervention projects and prevention and early intervention activity) to help mitigate the impact of the rising cost of living in the District. This will reinforce and supplement the projects set out in the Suffolk Tackling

Poverty Action Plan considered at the Suffolk Health and Wellbeing Board in early May 2022.

- 13. Of the 65 projects in the proposed programme, 2 have already been fully funded (Financial Inclusion Officers and Comfort Food) and 24 do not currently require any funding. This leaves 41 projects which require full or part funding. As outlined in paragraph 10 above, at least £291,000 has already been secured to support the programme. A potential additional minimum £50,000 could be available through a Business Rates Equalisation Reserve at East Suffolk Council, depending on end of year outturn.
- 14. The proposal to the Board is therefore that £100,000 be approved towards the programme to be allocated by the Task and Finish Group based on the priorities identified at the workshops held in May 2022 and on the basis of co-production with people who are experiencing challenges meeting the cost of living increases (including through the proposed Connect roadshows). This approach will provide the flexibility to allocate the funding where it will achieve greatest impact.
- 15. The Task and Finish Group will continue to meet additional Board members would be very welcome to join the group and will report back to the September Board meeting. It is worth noting that Felixstowe Peninsular Community Partnership have identified the Cost of Living increases as one of their revised priorities and that the Beccles, Bungay, Halesworth Community Partnership and Aldeburgh, Leiston and Saxmundham Community Partnership are both already delivering work around this theme.

#### Recommendations

#### It is recommended that the Board:

- 1) Consider and approve the outcome proposal attached as Appendix 1 to this report which requests the allocation of £100,000 to the emerging East Suffolk Cost of Living programme
- 2) Receive a report on progress at the meeting to be held in September 2022.

# Initial Outcome Proposal to the East Suffolk Community Partnership Board - FY2021/22

(Stage 1 Proposal)

#### 1. Key outcome(s)

Please detail the KEY OUTCOME(S) (Measurable and time specific) the proposal is looking to achieve: At its meeting in March 2022, the Board identified a range of potential impacts of the current Cost of Living crisis, these included:

- Increased levels of domestic violence and family breakdowns
- Increased incidences of homelessness
- Increase in crime (particularly acquisitive crime)
- Impact on mental health and wellbeing
- Increase in illness, hospitalisation and care needs
- Increased isolation and loneliness

The proposed outcomes that this programme of work will deliver to mitigate/reduce these impacts include:

- Improved resilience to the impact of rises in the cost of living within the East Suffolk population
- Improved mental health and wellbeing for residents due to a reduction in anxiety and stress
- Fewer people reaching the point of extreme, costly interventions e.g. home repossession or eviction due to non-payment of rent/mortgage
- Reduced social isolation and loneliness

#### 2. How has the need been identified?

The 'cost of living' is the average amount of money that individuals need to be able to cover basic living expenses, such as food and housing. The cost of living is rising across the board – housing costs, energy and water costs, fuel and food have all risen rapidly in price over recent months. The impact of these rises, combined with the ongoing impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on individuals, families, communities and the voluntary sector is likely to hit hard, particularly in Winter 2022/23. Inflation continues to climb, and the invasion of Ukraine by Russia has further increased pressures at a local and national level.

A wide range of services have been impacted – food banks are seeing higher usage than ever (with lots of first-time users, including those in work), Citizens Advice are dealing with unprecedented demand and our two Disability organisations are struggling to cope with requests for support.

Suffolk County Council has produced a cost-of-living profile for Suffolk which was considered at the May 2022 Health and Wellbeing Board Making-ends-meet-the-cost-of-living-suffolk.pdf (healthysuffolk.org.uk). This includes a wealth of information, but some notable points include:

- The March 2022 Office for Budget Responsibility, Economic and Fiscal Outlook identified that peak CPI inflation could reach 8.7% in the final quarter of 2022, leaving the average household £1,000 worse off than in 2021/22
- As inflation exceeds increases in wages, many individuals face the equivalent of a real term pay cut
- National Insurance contributions rose by 1.25% in April 2022, the energy cap rose by 54% (also in April) and the price of petrol has increased by more than 40p per litre

- Gross weekly pay for Suffolk residents is already £40 lower than England and £55 lower than the East of England
- An additional issue for those on low income is the 'poverty premium', where those on low incomes often pay more for basic goods and services including food, fuel and power - with those in the lowest 10% income decile spending more than double those in the highest 10% income decile
- An estimated four in five households will receive £150 via the Council Tax system and everyone
  will receive a £200 Energy Bills Rebate this Autumn, however this will not be enough to balance
  the books for most households
- ONS data from March 2022 indicates that 90% of respondents said that their increase in the cost
  of living was mainly due to an increase in the price of food. Food accounts for 14% of
  expenditure in lower income households compared to 8% for the highest income households
- Other key aspects include the rise in heating oil prices, the cost of childcare and the impact on health of cold homes
- 39% of adults in 2018 said that they did not feel confident in managing their money

Through a programme of meetings and workshops, including the Community Partnership Board Task and Finish Group focussing on Inequalities (which has made the Cost of Living increases its immediate priority), the key challenges have been identified against four key themes – money, food and essentials, energy and fuel and housing. These are shown below:

#### Money - The Challenges

- 1. Dealing with debt, affordable payment plans, loan sharks, conciliation loans, debt relief orders
- 2. Reducing spending e.g. energy, phone, TV packages, housing costs
- 3. Affordable credit and ethical loans
- 4. Help with budgeting, including in schools/with families
- 5. Cohorts who are asset rich but cash poor
- 6. Maximising income benefits and grants
- 7. Digital exclusion
- 8. Lack of access to a bank account and no ID documents
- 9. Just About Managing families in work and not on any benefits, miss out on most support provided
- 10. Parents unable to afford university costs
- 11. Disposable income squeeze leisure, health, childcare
- 12. Potential increase in addictions e.g. substance misuse and gambling

#### Food and Essential Items – The Challenges

- 1. Increasing food costs and supply issues
- 2. Lack of skills to cook healthy meals
- 3. Reducing donations to food banks and loss of volunteers
- 4. Lack of cooking facilities/fridge/freezer
- 5. Access to toiletries and sanitary products
- 6. Affordability of clothes, even from charity shops, including school uniforms and interview clothes
- 7. Oral hygiene lack of access to toothpase and toothbrush
- 8. The media telling people that healthy food is more expensive!
- 9. Loss of volunteers since Covid fear, need a rest, cost, re-entered labour market

#### **Energy and Fuel - Challenges**

- 1. Increasing cost of gas and electricity and increase in energy cap
- 2. Increase in heating oil price
- 3. Cost of wood and fuel for open fires and wood burners
- 4. Rising cost of petrol and disel and supply chain issues

- 5. Impact on VCSE organisations/community hubs e.g. loss of community transport drivers due to increased petrol costs
- 6. Net zero and climate change activities may disadvantage those on lower incomes
- 7. Stop start nature of energy efficiency programmes
- 8. Heat the Person not the Home v avoiding damp/disrepair and resultant health issues
- 9. Government support not reaching the most vulnerable
- 10. Volume of potential need due to energy price increases

#### **Housing – Challenges**

- 1. Less Money = non-payment of rent/mortgage
- 2. End of evictions moratorium and increased evictions
- 3. Discretionary Housing Payment allocation cut by 30%
- 4. Increase in families presenting as homeless
- 5. Rapid increase in house prices (second homes issue), rental values and larger gap in LHA rates
- 6. Lack of private rented and social housing / pressure on temporary accommodation / insecurity of tenure
- 7. Net Zero landlords selling up/increasing rents to cover energy improvement costs
- 8. Homes falling into disrepair because people can't afford to maintain
- 9. HMO issues quality, unregistered, occupants not eligible for refunds/benefits
- 10. Lack of supported housing beds

#### 3. Who will benefit from the outcomes?

This outcome proposal sets out our ambitions to develop a programme of activity in East Suffolk that will complement and supplement work at Suffolk level through the Health and Wellbeing Board to try to mitigate the impact of the cost-of-living crisis on the East Suffolk population.

The East Suffolk programme will benefit:

- Individuals and families who need urgent/crisis support through a range of interventions across the four priority areas
- Individuals and families who may tip into crisis at some point in the future through data-led (including use of LIFT) preventative work to enable them to manage the resources that they do have more effectively and increase financial literacy
- o Improved outcomes across the four priority areas should have a positive impact on mental health and wellbeing, loneliness and isolation
- Reducing the number of individuals and families needing service interventions e.g.
   homelessness, drug and alcohol and domestic abuse services will reduce the costs on the Suffolk system

#### 4. How will the outcomes(s) be sustained after the funding period (if appropriate)?

The proposals set out below are a mixture of urgent/crisis support and preventative activity and complement the significant investment at Suffolk level in initiatives such as the Local Welfare Assistance Scheme (LWAS), Suffolk Advice and Support Service (SASS) and support for Food Banks. The Public Health team at the County Council have been actively involved in the Task and Finish Group. The Suffolk Tackling Poverty Action Plan, developed by the Public Health team on behalf of the Suffolk Health and Wellbeing Board, has four aims – emergency support, increasing incomes and reducing costs, wellbeing and life chances and preventing poverty.

The work proposed in East Suffolk will complement and support delivery of this wider Suffolk programme but provide additional impetus in the District. Specific related actions in the Suffolk Plan include:

Fareshare have been commissioned to provide food to foodbanks and emergency food is stored

at Saxon House

- Suffolk Public Sector Leaders have agreed to underwrite LWAS and SASS costs up to £1,000,000
- Pilot 'Poverty Proofing of the School Day' initiative
- Increased offer and uptake of Health School Vouchers and Free School Meals
- Increase awareness of, and access to, Credit Unions
- Continue to work with Districts to develop the Holiday Activity and Food (HAF) programme
- Pilot a small grant pot to help overcome the barriers to escaping Poverty
- A new Community Development Officer Parent and Child Groups has been funded at Community Action Suffolk
- Good quality financial education schools, parents and VCSE organisations
- Poverty awareness training sessions and materials

East Suffolk Council has invested in two new Financial Inclusion Officer posts for two years. These staff will work with residents to maximise income, reduce debt, access affordable credit and budget effectively and realistically. East Suffolk Council agreed at Full Council in May 2022 that each Councillor would be given the opportunity to allocate £1,000 of their Enabling Communities Budget towards this cost of living programme (providing a maximum pot of £55,000).

This programme aligns well with the Well Minds East Suffolk programme supported by the Board at its March 2022 meeting.

#### 5. Name of Project/activity that will deliver the outcome(s)

Tackling the Rising Cost of Living in East Suffolk

#### 6. Brief description of the project / activity that will deliver the outcome(s).

Through a series of Task and Finish Group meetings plus two workshops (one for ESC staff and one for partners), a programme has been developed which sets out 1) Challenges (see Section 2 above), 2) Existing Activity and 3) Project Ideas, against our four themes of Money, Food and Essentials, Energy and Fuel and Housing. The project ideas represent our ambitions to mitigate the impact of the recent and ongoing cost of living rises on the East Suffolk population. The ask of the Board is for a pot of funding to enable implementation of these projects over the next twelve months.

Existing activity and the project ideas are set out against each theme below – the latter will be outlined in more detail at the Board meeting:

- M3. Expand the Early Intervention model for families (piloted in the Aldeburgh, Leiston, Saxmundham and villages CP area) to other CP areas, and build upon the work of the ESC Community Intervention Team with individuals
- M4. Ensure that all planned events and activities over the coming months have a 'financial inclusion' element
- M5. Build on libraries project/Grandpads and make kit available in community locations so that people can access digital services plus support and training from Digital Champions
- M6. More work around money and budgeting at key transition points e.g. leaving school, retirement, divorce. Sessions in schools (CAP/Money Matters)
- M7. Upskill key workers on the basis of Making Every Contact Count and ensure those on the ground know who to refer people to. Include Financial Inclusion in training for Customer Services staff/Digital Champions
- M8. Establish a fund to pay for people to access ID documents driving licence (£34) or birth certificate (£14) to enable them to open a bank account, prove their employment status and reduce the risk of financial abuse
- M9. Use a range of champions to enable people to access Open Banking services (e.g. Moneyhub, Yolt, Cleo). NB need to protect people from fraud
- M10. Talk to SCC about use of the Pupil Premium and additional opportunities to use this more effectively
- M11 Use Parentmail (or equivalent) to reach parents and DWP/Job Centres and ED Team to reach employers
- M12 Support workers to go where people already are e.g. Thin Ice/Comfort Food sessions, Community Pantries/Food Banks and Warm Rooms, plus groups such as brownies and scouts to address the stigma of seeking help

#### Report by Steve Gallant on the Outcomes of "Bringing Ideas to Life" East Suffolk Community Partnership Annual Forum 2022

#### 1. Forum Purpose:

For the Community Partnership Board to host a high-profile event in East Suffolk for representatives from our communities, voluntary organisations, public services and businesses that focusses on:

- The Board's strategic priorities.
- The recommendations of the Peer Review.
- The eight Community Partnerships to i) highlight the impact they are having within their communities and ii) problem solve shared challenges.
- Celebrating success and demonstrating the impact of the Community Partnership Board and Community Partnerships.
- Sharing knowledge and expertise in the Suffolk System and beyond to work together for the benefit of our communities and businesses in East Suffolk.

#### 2. Forum offer (to delegates):

- Networking opportunities across a range of different sessions.
- To get up to speed on what is happening and what is on the horizon in East Suffolk.
- Opportunity to collaborate and improve life for everyone who lives and works in East Suffolk.
- A platform to promote their organisation or business to a wide audience.

#### 3. Constraints:

- The forum was organised in line with Covid guidance and may have had to be cancelled or changed to a virtual event at short notice.
- Trinity Park Conference Centre is the sole venue in East Suffolk that met the event requirements in terms of numbers and break out rooms

#### 4. Resources:

- Support from individuals from a wide range of different organisations willing to offer resources and support to make it a success. The keynote speakers and facilitators did not charge for their time.
- Partnership Manager to pull the content together.
- ESC Communities Team support.
- £6,400.00 venue and catering costs.
- £3,357.50 to commission EELGA to provide event management support.
- Suffolk County Council sponsorship of breakfast session

#### 5. Attendance:

- 211 delegates
- 12 x 60-minute workshop / seminar sessions (each delegate attended two)
- 10 delegates attended the additional breakfast session aimed at local businesses
- 30 organisations occupied a free stall in the 'marketplace'
- Three organisations had their project vehicles on display outside

#### 6. Plenary:

- "Introduction to the day and update on progress of the East Suffolk Partnerships" by Steve Gallant
- "Partnerships and Parishes: Delivering for People and Places" by Jonathan Owen, Chief Executive, NALC

#### 7. Event Outcomes:

- Steve Gallant celebrated success and demonstrated the impact of the Community Partnership Board and Community Partnerships.
- Jonathan Owen promoted the importance of our Town and Parish Councils engaging in our Community Partnerships
- A packed morning of workshops and seminars included a blend of experts in their field, together with our own successful local community-led projects. Ten of the sessions focused on Community Partnership priorities and the remaining two tackled issues raised by the peer review (Communications and Problem Solving). The outcomes of these session are being picked up by a range of partners, as well as informing the work of the Board and individual community partnerships.

#### 8. How did we do?

A survey was created on SurveyMonkey, and a link sent to every delegate. The total number of responses was 101 (48%) and the results of that survey are shown in section 10 below.

Respondents were also given the option to comment, most of which were positive and supportive of the event in its current form. The following issues were also raised:

- Start time / location of the event makes it challenging for some delegates to get there using public transport
- More consideration be given to reduce the carbon footprint of the event


#### 9. Conclusion and recommendations



# Q1 Having attended the event, will anything you learned change the wayyou work? (1 - not at all. 4 - very much.)





# Q2 Did you find the event provided a useful networking opportunity? (1 -not useful. 4 - very useful.)





# Q3 How useful was the event for sharing information and knowledge aboutkey challenges and opportunities in East Suffolk? (1 - not useful. 4 - very useful.)





#### **East Suffolk Community Partnership Board**

#### Report from the Mental Health and Wellbeing Task and Finish Group

#### June 13, 2022

#### **Introduction and Background**

- 1. Mental Health and Wellbeing is one of the three priorities for the Community Partnership Board, identified through the eight workshops held to launch the Community Partnerships in November/December 2019.
- 2. The Board received a presentation from Jon Neil, Chief Officer of Suffolk Mind at its December 2021 meeting. Jon introduced the Suffolk Mind 'Your Needs Met' model and talked about the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on Emotional Wellbeing in Suffolk as well as outlining how Suffolk Mind could potentially support improved emotional wellbeing in a number of community contexts.
- 3. Following the presentation, a Task and Finish Group was formed to explore the concepts introduced by Jon and to develop an outcome proposal for the March Board meeting.
- 4. The Task and Finish Group met twice, chaired by Christine Abraham from Community Action Suffolk. Other organisations represented on the Task and Finish Group include Suffolk Community Foundation, Suffolk Mind, Norfolk and Suffolk Foundation Trust, Britten Arts, Suffolk County Council and East Suffolk Council.
- 5. The Group initially undertook an audit of existing activity around mental health and wellbeing in East Suffolk/Suffolk, including the £2.5 million COMF funded programme being led by Suffolk County Council Public Health Team, and focussed in on gaps in terms of emotional wellbeing in East Suffolk communities.
- 6. The Board received and approved an outcome proposal from the Task and Finish Group at its meeting in early March focussing on seven key areas of activity. The Stage 2 Outcome Proposal was agreed by the Board Chair in late March 2022 and a brief update on progress is provided below.

#### **Well Minds East Suffolk**

- 7. **Campaign** £5,000 was allocated for a campaign to help residents, groups and businesses to understand where and how to access information and support for a range of wellbeing issues.
  - Update a new public facing portal is currently being developed by Norfolk and Suffolk Foundation Trust and therefore it was agreed that we should develop the campaign once these are in place.

- 8. Neighbourhood level funding £12,500 was allocated for the three Integrated Neighbourhood Teams in the south of the District and the two Primary Care Networks in the north to tackle specific issues in their localities e.g. helping people to 'wait well' whilst waiting for treatment, support or a procedure.
  Update Discussions are underway with the three INTs in the south of East Suffolk and project ideas being developed through the Connect meetings. In the north of the District it has been agreed to wait until the new Waveney Health and Wellbeing Partnership is launched in July (part of the new Integrated Care System structure) as this will provide an ideal group to oversee the allocation of this funding.
- 9. Your Needs Met (Young People) £15,200 was allocated for East Suffolk pilot versions of the Your Needs Met training 'Emotional Wellbeing in the Classroom' (for schools) and 'Emotional Wellbeing for Children's Activities' (for those working with/supporting young people e.g. uniformed groups, sports coaches etc) 16 courses in total. Update Suffolk Mind have been commissioned and the training will be delivered in the Autumn 2022 term.
- 10. Theatre in Education £10,800 was allocated to sponsor 40 performances of the Theatre in Education sessions written by Yolanda Mercy around Emotional Wellbeing for Years 6 and 7 to enable these to be provided free in East Suffolk schools. The show is designed to unlock conversations about wellbeing and Suffolk Mind are providing free Emotional Needs and Resources materials and the opportunity to send up to four teachers per school to a twilight CPD session.
  Update the funding has been paid and the session promoted to East Suffolk schools, with a priority focus on those schools with children from more deprived backgrounds.
- 11. Pilot projects to support wellbeing in young people No funding was allocated but it was agreed that the Communities Team and partners would encourage applications for projects benefitting young people to various grants scheme including the ESC Boost Mental Wellbeing grants.
- 12. **Training (Adults)** A total of £24,400 was allocated for training around mental wellbeing and suicide awareness for those working in and supporting East Suffolk communities Update Suffolk Mind has been commissioned to provide their 'Your Needs Meet in the Community' courses aimed at VCSE organisations and community groups following the summer holidays. Work is underway to identify a provider/providers of training for barbers and tattoo parlours, taxi drivers etc who often spot signs of distress to ensure that they are equipped to have difficult conversations, and a trainer has been commissioned to provide additional 'Working with those in distress' training sessions, again Autumn 2022.
- 13. **Cuppa and Chat** £55,000 was allocated to commission a VCSE organisation to deliver a three tier 'Cuppa and Chat' service a virtual cuppa and chat network, one to one cuppa and chat in someone's home or garden (ideally delivered through existing Good Neighbour Schemes or community groups) and supporting people on a one to one basis to get back to face to face groups in community venues.

Update – the Request for Quotation for this service has been developed and this will be published mid-June. Evaluation process to include partners.

14. Total funding from the Board for this programme is £122,900 - £75,923 from 21/22 and £46,977 from 22/23 Community Partnership Board budgets.
