Item	Discussion
1.	<p><b>Welcome and Apologies</b></p> <p>The Chairman of the CP, Councillor Carol Poulter, welcomed everyone to the meeting and made a few introductory comments to assist with the smooth running of the meeting. She reminded everyone present that the meeting was being broadcast live via the Council's YouTube channel. In addition, the Chairman advised that any matters to be agreed would be by consensus rather than a formal vote.</p> <p>Apologies for absence had been received from Julia Catterwell (Communities Officer), Cllr John Jones (Framlingham Town Council) and Bryony Peall (IP17 Good Neighbour Scheme).</p>
2.	<p><b>Notes</b></p> <p>The Notes of the meeting held on 1 July 2021 were agreed as a correct record.</p>

<p><b>3.</b></p>	<p><b>Feedback from the Community Partnership Board meeting on 6 September 2021</b></p> <p>The CP received a report which provided details of the progress and outcomes of the CP Board meeting held on 6 September 2021.</p> <p>The Chairman advised that the report could be taken as read, unless there were any specific questions and invited the Head of Communities to highlight any specific items.</p> <p>The Head of Communities advised that the main focus had been on transport and commented that the data for the Katch bus would help to understand its performance. It was positive that the Board wished to build on its success in this CP's area and was to look at funding allocation for marketing to expand the service into other areas and reach more villages. In addition, further information had been provided from the Covid Impact Task Group.</p> <p>The Head of Communities thanked all those who had taken part in the Peer Review Challenge that had been undertaken by the LGA, The CP Board was to receive a detailed report and there would be some feedback at the CP Forum on 5 November which was open to all CP Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen.</p>
<p><b>4.</b></p>	<p><b>Revisit the CP's Priorities</b></p> <p>The Communities Officer reminded the CP of its agreed priorities:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <u>Developing Opportunities for Young People</u> This covered a broad area and covered different aspects to support youngsters, including working with schools in the area.</li> <li>2. <u>Reduce Social Isolation and Loneliness</u> This was a key priority across most of the East Suffolk CPs and could be supported in many different ways.</li> <li>3. <u>Sustainable Transport</u> Sustainable transport was being looked at, at CP Board level and it was hoped to get new data on the use of the Katch bus which would support it being extended.</li> </ol> <p>The Head of Communities advised that data was available for the whole District, however, the individual data packs for each of the eight CPs was not yet available. Initial findings related to the impact of Covid on particular groups, performance of the CPs, house prices to income ratio, movement in population, and other interesting statistics. It was hoped to have revised data at local levels available in 2022 along with the most recent census data.</p>

	<p>The Chairman proposed, and it was agreed, that the CP's priorities should continue and be reviewed once the new data was available.</p>
<b>5.</b>	<p><b>Funding Plan</b></p> <p>The Communities Officer updated the CP with regard to the £25,000 funding that was available this year, none of which had yet been allocated.</p> <p><b>a) Grants Scheme</b></p> <p>The Communities Officer proposed that an amount of £20,000 be split between the two remaining priorities to provide small grants, leaving £5,000 for any other project ideas which might come forward.</p> <p>This was supported.</p> <p><b>b) Launch Dates</b></p> <p>The Communities Officer had been in discussion with the Funding Officer and, if the CP agreed, a small grants scheme could be launched on 2 November with a closing date of 30 November 2021, with a view to a Small Grants Panel meeting during week commencing 13 December. That would allow projects, if approved, to move forward at an early stage.</p> <p>This was agreed.</p> <p><b>c) Funding Panel</b></p> <p>A Small Gants Panel was appointed comprising:</p> <p>Cllr Carol Poulter, Chairman  Cllr John Cross, Great Glemham PC  Dick Jenkinson, Wickham Market Good Neighbour Scheme  Cllr Kathryn Jones, Ufford PC  Cllr Adrian Revill – Hacheston PC  1 rep – Framlingham TC  Joss Mullett, Communities Officer</p> <p><b>Note:</b> Subsequent to the meeting, Cllr Marion Hine volunteered to be the representative from Framlingham TC.</p> <p><b>Action: Joss Mullett</b></p>

	<p>The CP also discussed:</p> <p><u>Funding for Rural Youth Provision</u></p> <p>The Head of Communities referred to an exciting new pilot project that would enable the development of sustainable youth provision in rural communities in East Suffolk. A report was going to Cabinet on 2 November seeking funding to target rural areas in four of the CP areas. The proposal would see CAS working with rural communities to identify how the needs of young people could be understood and then met.</p> <p>The Chairman of the CP hoped that the Cabinet Members would support the proposal when considering the report.</p> <p><u>Digital Connectivity and Mobiles in Rural Areas</u></p> <p>Councillor Burroughes made reference to the rural proofing and particularly digital connectivity and mobiles. Work was being undertaken with SCC, ESC and SALC and he advised that a questionnaire was due to be circulated to all parishes in the east Suffolk area to ascertain where they stood with technology/connectivity/its use. The digital audit would also ascertain what equipment might be needed in different parishes. The data received would be analysed to identify any weaknesses in the parishes, what the situation was and what could be done about it.</p> <p>The CP discussed in detail the benefits of remote meetings where technology allowed such meetings, the carbon reduction as a result of less miles travelled, printing out papers before a meeting due to no connectivity, and the success of the Fram Broadband. It might be a project all CPs would be interested in following up and consider making a financial contribution in their areas.</p> <p>Councillor Burroughes asked that this be an agenda item for the next CP meeting and he proposed that the CP consider future funding for those parishes lacking in technology. He suggested that the information be circulated to all CP Chairs for their information.</p> <p><b>Action: Sarah Carter</b></p>
<b>6.</b>	<p><b>Date of next meeting</b></p> <p>It was noted that the next meeting would be held on Thursday, 13 January 2022 at 6.00pm. The Chairman advised that this meeting would be virtual via Zoom.</p>



<b>7.</b>	<p><b>Any Other Business</b></p> <p><u>Age Friendly Community Survey</u></p> <p>Cllr Cross referred to the details recently circulated relating to the survey for the over 55s and, whilst the closing date had been mentioned as 4 October, the survey was still active. ## Key outcomes of the East Suffolk Community Partnership Board meeting held 6 December 2021

### 1 Introduction

All eight Community Partnerships are represented on the Community Partnership Board by their respective Chairs.

### 2. Community Partnership Board Priority 3: Mental Health and Wellbeing

Jon Neil (CEO, Suffolk MIND) delivered a presentation on “How has Covid19 and lockdown affected the mental health of local people?” (viewed [HERE](#)) in which he outlined the Mental Health Continuum Model and presented data on how lock down affected us.

The Board agreed that a Mental Health and Wellbeing Task and Finish Group be convened to develop outcome proposals for consideration at a future meeting.

### 3. Focus on Community Partnerships

The Board received its regular update on the impact of the eight Community Partnerships. The report can be viewed [HERE](#). In addition, the Board received a short presentation from Felixstowe Peninsular ([HERE](#)) and Lowestoft and Northern Parishes Community Partnerships ([HERE](#))

### 4. Community Partnership Board Priorities

The Board received a report ([HERE](#)) and presentation from Nicole Rickard (Head of Communities, East Suffolk Council & NHS Norfolk & Waveney / Ipswich & East Suffolk CCGs) based on the outcomes of:

- The Covid Recovery Task and Finish Group
- Revised East Suffolk Data Pack ([HERE](#))
- Data Pack feedback from the Community Partnership Board Visioning Event, held at Trinity Park on 5 November ([HERE](#))
- Outcomes from a discussion in the Beccles, Bungay, Halesworth and villages Community Partnership on their emergent priorities around the cost of living and living standards ([HERE](#))

The Board agreed:

- That the Board maintain its focus on i) **Social Isolation and Loneliness** ii) **Sustainable Transport and Travel** and iii) **Mental Health and Wellbeing**
- That a new Task and Finish Group be convened to consider various ‘hidden Needs’ and inequalities, absorbing the outstanding work of the Covid Recovery Task and Finish Group and previous focus on Hidden Needs, and taking a wider perspective on **vulnerability**
- That Board partners work through the new Integrated Care System structures to emphasise importance of work around health inequalities

- That specific focus be placed on healthy weight in the places with the highest levels of children and adults who are overweight and obese – namely Lowestoft and Northern Parishes CP, Aldeburgh, Leiston and Saxmundham CP and Felixstowe Peninsula CP.

## **5. Peer Challenge of Community Partnerships and Draft Action Plan**

The Board received a report ([HERE](#)) from Steve Gallant, Chair of the Community Partnership Board based on i) a summary of the findings of the Local Government Association Peer Challenge of Community Partnerships held 12-14 October 2021 and ii) the outcomes of the Community Partnership Visioning Day held 5 November 2021

The Board then considered a draft plan of action ([HERE](#)) to agree what actions should be taken to address the issues raised by the Peer Challenge Team.

It was agreed that the Community Partnership Steering Group be given responsibility to oversee implementation of the action plan on behalf of the Board and report back regularly on progress.

## **6. Update: Community Partnership Annual Forum**

At the September 2021 Board meeting it was agreed that, as Covid-19 still had a significant presence in the district, region and nationally, holding an event for 150-200 people at Trinity Park would not be wise on the date scheduled in November. Therefore, it was agreed to postpone until March 2022.

The Board received an update ([HERE](#)) from Luke Bennett (Partnerships Manager, East Suffolk Council).

The current situation is that Trinity Park is booked for an event for 200 delegates on **25 March 2022**.

Uncertainty over Government imposing restrictions on events / social contact due to Covid-19 in the future remains a significant risk associated with organising a face-to-face event of this size. Therefore, any plans will need to ensure adequate social distancing, be flexible to potentially reducing the number of delegates if the situation changes and carry the disclaimer that it may be cancelled at late notice.

The theme will be 'East Suffolk: Bringing Ideas to Life' and will highlight and support delivery of the Community Partnerships/Board priorities by addressing a range of challenges and opportunities thrown up by the Peer Challenge of Community Partnerships.

Members of the Community Partnerships are asked to make every effort to attend the event and consider what you could each contribute to the proposed programme.
