1.	Welcome and Apologies
	Apologies for absence were received from:

2.	Appointment of a Vice-Chairman
	Sharon Harkin from Felixstowe Town Council was appointed as the Community Partnership's Vice-Chairman for the remainder of the year.
3.	Notes of the previous meeting
	The action notes of the previous meeting were agreed as a correct record.



4. **Community Partnership Board Update** Luke Bennett, the East Suffolk Partnerships Manager, summarised the Community Partnership Board update report that had been included in the meeting papers. Luke Bennett was pleased to report that the Board's work resonated with the work being completed by the eight Community Partnerships; the Board looked at strategic issues but it was pleasing to see the connect between the Board and the Community Partnerships. Luke Bennett summarised the following topics that were discussed at the last meeting of the Board: The VCSE Bounceback Fund • Grandpad Transport issues The East Suffolk Community Partnership Forum Cllr Gallant commented on the East Suffolk Community Partnership Forum and explained that it would be done virtually this year; he considered that the sessions planned and the key speakers secured were positive and encouraged everyone to attend and spread the word about the event. There was significant discussion around the Grandpads including how recipients were identified, how the Grandpads worked and were loaned out, the security of the devices. Luke Bennett and Chloe Lee gave assurances on the security of the devices and the simplicity of their use; Chloe Lee explained that there was nothing you could not do on a Grandpad that you could do on a smartphone or tablet. Luke Bennett outlined the family administrator role and confirmed that where a user did not have anyone to fulfil this role, they would be provided with an administrator from Techsilver, who provide the Grandpads. Cllr Bird sought reassurance that the Grandpads were value for money. Cllr Gallant explained that Techsilver had been very responsive to East Suffolk Council's needs and had, for instance, been able to provide Zoom on the devices in response to a request to do so. Cllr Green asked if FACTS had been consulted by the Board regarding transport issues. Luke Bennett advised that individual providers had not been consulted at this stage and this would take place later in the process.



5.	Review of the existing Community Partnership Projects
	Felixstowe Library Project
	Chloe Lee advised that the project had been given £5,000 to develop a new children's area at Felixstowe Library. As of earlier that week, decorating had begun, new flooring had been ordered and an order for bespoke shelving was being finalised.
	Felixstowe Academy Library Project
	Chloe Lee confirmed that equipment had been ordered and the project was progressing well.
	Community Directory
	Chloe Lee and Ash Tadjrishi recapped the history of the project; following research it had been identified that Felixstowe Town Council's website would be the best platform for the Community Directory.
	Ash Tadjrishi advised that he had met with Felixstowe Town Council's web provider earlier in the week and it was estimated that it would cost between £1,500 and £2,000 to produce the Community Directory, which would cover the whole Community Partnership area.
	Exactly how the directory would be administered and how community groups could self-administer their entries, noting IT barriers that may be in place for some community groups. Ash hoped to provide a more tangible update shortly.
	Chloe Lee noted that there had been some confusion about the level of funding allocated to this project at the previous meeting; she proposed that the Community Partnership allocate a maximum of £2,000 to the project.
	Members of the Community Partnership were in favour of the project; it was confirmed that information for the directory had been collected during Chloe Lee's contact with community groups and the link to the directory would be promoted to community groups.
	The Community Partnership agreed to allocate a maximum of £2,000 for the project.
	ACTION A maximum of £2,000 to be allocated to the Community Directory project.



	Small Grants Scheme
	Chloe Lee explained that the Task and Finish Group had met and produced detailed guidance and a process for grant applications, which would be reviewed and signed off by East Suffolk Council's funding team. Once approved, the small grants scheme could then begin to receive applications, which would be limited to a maximum of £2,000 per application. Applications would be appraised by the funding team to ensure that they meet the criteria established and then referred to the Task and Finish group which would form the panel to approve/reject applications.
	Cllr Jepson thanked those who had taken part in the Task and Finish group and was pleased to see that a grant process and application form had been developed and could be used by other Community Partnerships.
6.	Consideration of new Community Partnership Projects
	Nacton Playspace
	Brian Hunt, from Nacton Parish Council, outlined a proposed project to expand a large open area of land in the centre of Nacton to make it more beneficial for residents. A questionnaire had recently been circulated to residents and would close in three weeks' time. Brian explained that the Parish Council wanted to improve the whole area so that it could be used by the whole community and becomes part of the centre of the village; he added that he was not seeking funding at this stage but was looking for support for the project in principle.
	Chloe Lee explained that funding available for the project was from Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding that needed to be spent on a sport remit, so the playspace would need to have a sporting theme; Chloe highlighted that this matched one of the Community Partnership's priorities.
	Cllr Kerry noted that he would be happy to support this project from his Enabling Communities budget.
	The Community Partnership agreed to support the project in principle and would consider funding it when further detail was available.
	Potential Art Project Trail Felixstowe
	Cllr Jepson outlined the conceptual project for an art trail in Felixstowe that had been circulated to Community Partnership members. He explained that this had



	 been produced alongside a local artist who wanted to put together a similar art trail to the Elmer Elephants that had been installed in Ipswich, possibly using a duck as a model. The main aim and passion of the artist was to bring art to Felixstowe in a 'quirky' way. It had been suggested that money could be raised through sponsorship or charities. Cllr Jepson acknowledged that the Community Partnership might not be the best forum for this opportunity. It was suggested by Cllr Newman that any project such as this could be linked to the existing 'Art on the Prom' event in Felixstowe. The concept was compared to several other similar projects in Ipswich, Wesel and Liverpool. Several members of the Community Partnership considered that the proposal did not have enough detail and did not necessarily directly meet the Community Partnership's priorities.
7.	Review of the Core MembershipCllr Jepson proposed that Sarah Wilson should be added to the Community Partnership's core membership. It was highlighted that Sarah was a Felixstowe resident with significant experience in the voluntary and community sectors and would be an asset to the Community Partnership.Several members of the Community Partnership spoke on the skills that Sarah Wilson would add to the Community Partnership.It was agreed to add Sarah Wilson to the core membership as a community volunteer.

COVID-19 YOUNG PEOPLE'S SURVEY

East Suffolk Council and Youth Voice wanted to understand how the Coronavirus has affected young people across East Suffolk. Therefore, we decided to conduct a survey.

87 YOUNG PEOPLE responded and East Suffolk Council will use the collected data to help identify what support may be needed for young people during future waves of Covid-19 and the recovery process.

47% of respondents were aged 13-15. 68% of responses were from Lowestoft residents with 20 Towns and Villages being represented in total.

BIGGEST CONCERNS DUE TO COVID-19...

- School and education, including GCSE's and falling behind in their studies.
- Risk of family and people they care about catching Covid-19.
- Not being able to see friends.
- How will life look post Covid-19.

HOW HAVE YOU BEEN HELPED DURING COVID-19?

- Schools have provided work packs, online learning, teacher phone calls and zoom catch ups
- 21% have been supported through community initiatives or groups such as youth clubs, church groups, the Scouts, drama clubs and sports.

16% have received support through talking to friends online

said family have helped them with schoolwork and mental and emotional support **21%** said they felt they didn't

SUPPORT FOR THE FUTURE...

- Respondents discussed they would like more contact with their school including more Zoom lessons and better resources (internet for students who can't access it at home)
- More reassurance and updates of what is going on in the community and how things are going to change.
- Students would like more counsellors in school and on the internet to provide
 - mental health support.
- Future unemployment support and advice.
- 15% felt they don't require any future support.

POSITIVE IMPACTS...

- More time for themselves, getting to know themselves better, and appreciating what they have in life.
- Being more active and eating healthier.

• 26% felt there was no positive impact for them.

WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FORWARD TO POST-COVID-19...

- 49% are looking forward to seeing friends and family.
- 11% said not having to worry mentally anymore about Covid-19.
- 23% said continuing hobbies such as football, shopping, cinema and eating out.
- 17% are looking forward to returning to school.

WHAT NEXT....

East Suffolk Council will share responses with our partners, including schools, Town and Parish Councils and youth service providers who will be encouraged to consider the findings when delivering services in the future which impact on young people. Students across East Suffolk will also be considering the findings from this survey during a multi-schools event in November this year to try and combat social isolation in communities. Funding from East Suffolk Council will assist in making some of the students ideas from this event become a reality.
