Minutes of a Meeting of the Licensing Committee held in the Deben Conference Room, East Suffolk House, on Monday, 1 August 2022 at 6.30 pm

1 Apologies for Absence and Substitutions

There were no apologies for absence.

2 Declarations of Interest

There were no Declarations of Interest.

3 Minutes

RESOLVED

That the Minutes of the Meeting held on 11 April 2022 be confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

4 Application for Taxi Fare Increase

The Cabinet Member with responsibility for Community Health introduced report **ES/1215** which was a proposal received from a group of licensed Hackney Carriage drivers in the North of the East Suffolk District for an increase to the Hackney Carriage fares tariff for the North of the district. The Licensing Manager and Housing Lead Lawyer explained that the last increase was in September 2012 and summarised the proposal and its effects.

Members questioned:

- How the charges between the North and South of the District compared, and whether there should be an aligned fare structure for the whole District
- How many Hackney Carriage drivers were operating in the District
- Which tariff would apply if a driver picked up a passenger in Lowestoft and dropped them off in Melton
- Whether wheelchairs were considered to be luggage
- Whether the proposal would affect Private Hire Vehicles

The Licensing Manager and Housing Lead Lawyer advised:

- That the matter for decision by Members only related to the North of the District.
 There was no proposal for an aligned fare structure, but Members observations would be noted
- There were 178 Hackney Carriage drivers, a reduction on the 186 operating in the District in March 2022
- The Hackney Carriage Meter was calibrated according to originating location
 Wheelchairs were not luggage
- The proposal related to Hackney Carriage vehicles only

The Licensing Manager and Housing Lead Lawyer explained that resolution of the Committee would be subject to consultation, the outcome of which would then be presented to a future meeting of the Committee.

Councillor Rudd reminded Members that the proposal had been put to the Committee by the drivers in the North of the district, who had not asked for alignment with the South. Councillor Rudd drew Members attention to the Licensing Committee meeting of 19 April 2021 where it was agreed to continue with the existing arrangement of having two tariff tables in the East Suffolk district; one in the North of the district (the former Waveney District Council area) and one in the South of the district (the former Suffolk Coastal District Council area).

Councillor Robinson observed that due to the significant passing of time since the last review, it may now be appropriate for the trade to be urged to come forward with proposals no more than three years since their last proposal. Councillor Rudd cautioned that the Committee had agreed at its meeting of 19 April 2021 to continue with the existing custom and practice of the trade proposing a new tariff table for the Licensing Authority to approve and formally consult on as and when they considered that an increase was appropriate or necessary.

Councillor Robinson proposed, and Councillor Back seconded an amendment that "Subject to the removal of the luggage charge, the increase to the hackney carriage fare tariff for the North of the district, be approved for consultation". Upon the amendment being put to the vote, by a majority, the amendment was **CARRIED** and became the substantive motion.

Members in support of the substantive motion perceived that the luggage charge was outdated and no longer justifiable, as customers would expect to be able to have their bag carried without incurring a separate charge. It would also partially offset the

overall increase, which would come at a time where cost of living increases were impacting household incomes. Councillor Coulam disagreed and was of the view that it was not feasible to remove the charge completely and cautioned that drivers had asked for an increase.

The Chairman invited any further amendments. Councillor Coulam proposed, and Councillor Craig seconded an amendment that the increase to the hackney carriage fare tariff for the North of the district, subject to the soiling charge being increased from £40 to £80, be approved for consultation. Upon being put to the vote, the amendment was **NOT CARRIED**.

Councillor Wiles moved, and Councillor Ashdown seconded the substantive motion that subject to the removal of the luggage charge, the increase to the hackney carriage fare tariff for the North of the district, be approved for consultation. Upon being put to the vote, it was by a majority

RESOLVED

That subject to the removal of the luggage charge, the increase to the hackney carriage fare tariff for the North of the district, be approved for consultation.

5 Fuel Surcharge for Hackney Carriage Vehicles in the East Suffolk District

The Cabinet Member with responsibility for Community Health introduced report **ES/1216** which presented the outcome of the recent consultation exercise on the proposals from a group of licensed hackney carriage drivers for a fuel surcharge.

At its meeting on 11 April 2022, the Licensing Committee considered a proposal for a fuel surcharge from licensed drivers. The Committee had rejected the proposal and instead proposed a fuel surcharge of 20p per journey for a temporary period of three months. All licensed Hackney Carriage drivers were consulted for 28 days from 16 April to 13 May 2022.

The Licensing Manager and Housing Lead Lawyer explained that one consultation response had been received, which was a counterproposal to introduce a surcharge of 20p for every 4 miles travelled, calculated by the trip meter. The Committee was advised that the counterproposal was unlawful and would not satisfy Section 58 of The Town Police Clauses Act 1847. Therefore, no lawful solution had been forthcoming from licensed drivers in response to the consultation.

There being no questions or debate; Councillor Cooper proposed, Councillor Hedgley seconded, and it was by a majority

RESOLVED

To not introduce a fuel surcharge.

6 Introduction of two new pieces of legislation – The Taxis And Private Hire Vehicles (Disabled Persons) Act 2022, and The Taxis and Private Hire Vehicles (Safeguarding And Road Safety) Act 2022

The Cabinet Member with responsibility for Community Health introduced report **ES/1217** which sought the necessary additions and updates to the Council's Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Licensing Policy consequent to two new pieces of legislation i) The Taxis and Private Hire Vehicles (Disabled Persons) Act 2022; and The Taxis and Private Hire Vehicles (Safeguarding and Road Safety) Act 2022.

The Licensing Manager and Housing Lead Lawyer advised that the Council was required to absorb the legislation within its policies and explained that the Acts aimed to ensure that disabled people could use taxi and private hire services with confidence that they would not be discriminated against. From 28 June 2022, all Hackney Carriage and Private Hire drivers and operators, would be subject to duties under the Equality Act 2010, regardless of whether the vehicle was wheelchair accessible.

All drivers would be required to accept the carriage of any disabled person, provide them with reasonable mobility assistance, and carry their mobility aids, without charging any more than they would for a non-disabled passenger. Drivers would also have to provide any disabled passenger on request, with assistance to identify the vehicle available. All private hire operators would be required to accept bookings for or on behalf of any disabled person, if they had a suitable vehicle available.

There being no questions or debate; Councillor Goldson proposed, Councillor Ashdown seconded, and it was unanimously

RESOLVED

That the additions and updates to the Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Licensing Policy, be approved.

7 Issued Licences in East Suffolk and an Overview of the work of the Licensing Sub-Committees April – June 2022

The Cabinet Member with responsibility for Community Health introduced report **ES/1218** which provided Members with information relating to issued licences in East Suffolk and gave an overview of the work of the Licensing Sub-Committees during the period. Licensing plays an important role in the themes in the Council's Strategic Plan of growing our economy and enabling our community's Hackney carriage (and private hire vehicles) are a key part of the public transport system, enabling people without their own private transport or without easy access to other means of public transport to travel for education, employment, and entertainment, to shop and to attend medical appointments or deliver/receive care.

Background and Justification for Recommendation

1	Background facts
1.1	The Council is responsible for licensing hackney carriage and private hire drivers and vehicles, and private hire operators. It has the power to set and vary fares for hackney carriages under section 65 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976.
	Section 55 of the Town Police Clauses Act 1847 prohibits the driver of a hackney carriage from charging more than the set fare.
1.2	On 1 August 2022, the Licensing Committee approved the new fares proposed by a group of licensed hackney carriage drivers. The Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 provides that the proposed new fares are published, and objections invited.
1.3	The notices were published in two local newspapers on 12 August 2022 and were displayed for a period of 14 days at the Council's offices. All licensed hackney carriage drivers in East Suffolk were sent a letter. The consultation ended on 26 August 2022.
	Two objections were received.
	One comment was received from a Private Hire Operator regarding the calculation of the initial waiting time. It would appear that the proposal submitted by the group of hackney carriage drivers did not include a correct calculation for the initial waiting time and this had gone unnoticed at the last Licensing Committee meeting.
	The initial waiting time, as stated in the proposal, would have caused a negative effect for passengers as it would have meant that the meter would have dropped to the next payment quicker than it should have done. The time difference is only a matter of a few seconds but nonetheless, the Licensing Authority should ensure that the fare calculations are fair to both drivers and passengers. There is a set calculation that Licensing Authorities should use to

determine time and distance and this is what agents for meter companies use to calculate and calibrate their meters. This calculation has now been used and has been checked by an independent meter agent. The amended initial waiting time is included in the proposed tariff fare table attached as **Appendix A**. The two objections and the comment regarding the initial waiting time are attached as Appendix B. 1.4 Section 65 (4) of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 provides that the district council must consider any objections, if they are not withdrawn, and set a further date, not later than two months after the first specified date, on which the table of fares shall come into force, with or without modifications after consideration of the objections. The first specified date was 26 August 2022 as indicated by the public notice placed in two local newspapers and the Council's offices on 12 August 2022. The adjustment to the initial waiting time must be added to any new fare tariff table since this was an error. The two objections should be considered by the Licensing Committee.

2	Current position
2.1	The current North fare tariff table is attached as Appendix C.
2.2	On 1 August 2022, the Licensing Committee approved the new fares proposed by a group of licensed hackney carriage drivers subject to the removal of the luggage charge.
	The proposed new tariff fare table is attached as Appendix A .
2.3	Two objections have been received regarding the proposed tariff increase.
2.4	One comment was received regarding the initial waiting time on Tariffs 1, 2 and 3 being incorrect.

3	How to address current situation
3.1	The Licensing Committee will need to consider the two objections and decide whether to make any modifications to the proposed North fare tariff table which was published on 12 August 2022.
3.2	The adjustment to the initial waiting time must be added to any new fare tariff table since this was an error.

4	Reason/s for recommendation
4.1	To determine whether any modifications should be made to the proposed hackney carriage fares tariff as approved on 1 August 2022 and published on 12 August 2022.
4.2	To comply with the requirements to determine applications for an increase in a fare tariff in accordance with the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976.
